Smith, Lane: **Madam President.** A little girl imagines what her day would be like if she were President of the United States. **Ju E Smi.**



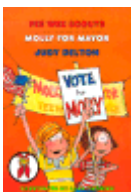

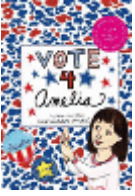
Alberto, Daisy: **Pete for President.** Best friends compete with each other for third grade class president. **Ju F Alb.**

Moss, Marissa: **Vote 4 Amelia**. Amelia records her thoughts and feelings about running for school secretary. **Ju F Mos**.



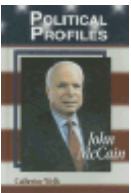
